Headteacher's Message

Our Christian ethos is always precious to us and underpins who we are and how we work together as a community. We have, as a whole school, been focusing on the 40Acts Lent Challenges. We have a challenge for each day which students and staff have been respectfully considering and reflecting on the messages around Lent.

We have just completed a piece of work on developing our Christian Values. We invited students and staff to choose a bible verse and a hymn to represent each value. We will be announcing the winners of our 'Write a Values Prayer Competition' at the end of this term. The winning entries will also be published on our website.

On Sunday 7th February, we were invited to take part in the Parish Communion Service at St Martin-in the-Fields Church, Trafalgar Square. Representatives from St Martin's and Archbishop Tenison's made musical and reading contributions to the service which was to affirm our 300+ year relationship with the church. It was also an opportunity to celebrate and showcase our achievements in the public arena.





It was also a delight to take part in the Mayor of Lambeth's Civic Church Service on Sunday 13th March. A small group of girls sung beautifully at this commissioning service and it was a joy to be part of this community event at St John's Church, Angell Town. The girls were thrilled to have their photograph taken with the newly commissioned Mayor (above).

A celebration of the Commonwealth took place at Westminster Abbey on Monday 14th March, in the presence of Her Majesty The Queen, Head of the Commonwealth. The Duke of Edinburgh, the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge and Prince Harry also attended the annual


We look forward to welcoming students back on 11th April.

News from Drama

Great Expectations

On Thursday 28th and Friday 29th January St Martin's presented our production of Charles Dicken's Great Expectations. The students did extremely well to interpret the dense text and produced some star performances. The drama department would like to say thank you to the cast for their commitment, time enthusiasm, to staff who helped us to facilitate the production, and also to the families, friends and members of the school community who attended.



GCSE Drama

Our Year 10 GCSE Drama students have been very busy this Spring. They have continued to extend their theatrical knowledge through the Old New Voices Schools' Club programme. The Drama department have worked with the Old Vic education team to ensure that our girls can explore a range of classic and contemporary plays in workshops and as spectators in the Old Vic theatre. On 2nd March pupils went to see an interpretation of Henrik Ibsen's The Master Builder at the Old Vic theatre which featured award-winning actor Ralph Fiennes. The girls were particularly enthused by the very dramatic ending. This trip to the theatre were preceded by a workshop

that helped to develop the girls' theatrical knowledge and put the play in context.

In February, the students participated in a performance evening where they performed a range of selected monologues and duologues to an invited audience. It was clear that pupils had worked hard to embody the characters and that the girls have the potential to achieve excellently in their practical examinations.

At the end of April, Year 11 students will perform in their final practical examination, sharing a piece of drama that explores 'consequences'. The girls have been rehearsing outside of lessons and will give a sneak preview of their work in March in front of an invited audience.

Sixth Form

In January, our Year 12 students attended a production of Les Liaisons Dangereuses the Donmar at Warehouse theatre in Covent Garden. It was a production of exceptional quality which was loved appreciated by the girls. Students also had the privilege of meeting some of the cast (below). Prior the show, students experienced a workshop exploring the text that helped them to understand the key themes and complexity of the main characters.





Summer Term

In May, eighteen Year 9 students will perform in a production of 'Stay Another Song' at the Young Vic theatre alongside London Nautical school students. A performance inspired by another Young Vic show: If You Kiss Me, Kiss Me. They have been developing material and rehearsing since January with the Young Vic team and will perform over four nights at the Young Vic theatre. We eagerly await their first performance and know that they will make us proud!

Much to be Proud of!

Congratulations to all the students who have been representing the school on different occasions over the last few months.

We were invited to an annual Service with our founding church St Martin-in-the-Fields in Trafalgar Square (pictured right) where a small choral group performed Jesus is Real by Isaac Simpson and our GCSE Music student Rebecca Joseph gave an excellent rendition of Duo Sentimental by Joaquin Tourin.

Upper School and Sixth Form Theatre Trips

Students in Year 10 and Year 12 are studying new exam texts in preparation for the new style GCSE and A Level examinations. Living in London has provided them with a golden opportunity to see acclaimed theatre productions of some of these. There is nothing like moving a text from page to stage to make it more memorable. Year 12 students

went to the Young Vic to see an exciting vibrant and modern take on Shakespeare's "Measure for Measure" and Year 10 students saw an excellent production of "Jane Eyre" at the National Theatre. Hopefully, they'll all be able to remember their quotations more easily now!



Sprint to the Finish

It has been a busy term indeed. Sixth Formers had a second set of Pre Public Examinations at the end of February. The results are very promising for the vast majority of our students, many of whom have now secured offers with the elite Russell group universities, including two for Medicine. They do have to remember that these are only offers and that real places still depend on final results. This last 'Sprint to the finish' will be 'make or break' for both the year 12 and 13. It is vital that they spend much of the Easter break revising hard. AS exams start on 16th May. A Level exams start on 6th June.

We recommend that students spend a minimum of 15 hours a week on each subject over the Easter break. One of the most effective revision techniques at this stage is the completion of past papers in timed conditions. Parents and Guardians could help by setting up a space and time for these to be done.

For the past two years we have been running a very successful Sixth Form Work Experience programme. Last year we had students placed in a wide range of industries including Law firms, Medical Practises, Retail, Dentists and Financial Services. Noreen Heese, one of our Russell Group students who spent a week with the Commercial Law firm Nabarro said of her experience "I have learnt invaluable life lessons that will aid me in my academic/non academic pursuits and I had a time great doing it! experience has confirmed that law is for me." This year work experience runs from the 4th to the 15th July.

In January, the Mark Evison foundation visited the Sixth Form www.markevisonfoundation.org.

Established in 2009 to promote the personal, social and physical development of young people they offer one off grants of up to £500 for students who can put together a bid to engage in an activity that will lead transformational change; change that will make a real and lasting change to who they are". Last year two of our students, sisters Adaobi and Onyekachi Akabuike were awarded a grant and used the money to fund a cycling challenge which saw them ride from London to Newcastle. This year two groups have been awarded grants. One is planning a hiking adventure in the Scottish Highlands whilst the other is organising a local talent event. We will of course keep you informed of their progress and report on their adventures in the Autumn newsletter.

As you can see we have been busy, but once again I want to reiterate that we are beginning the 'Sprint to the Finish' and all our students need to keep clearly focused on the main goal which is to achieve their full potential in their summer exams. All other distractions should now go on hold. Where possible Students with part time jobs should reduce hours or stop completely and Social Lives should also take a back seat if any at all. Our students have been working incredibly hard and I wish them all verv best in examinations. I look forward to seeing many very happy faces on results day in August.

This competition was judged by writers Inua Ellams and Irenosen Okojie, Patrick Spottiswoode (director of Globe Education) and Rebecca Simor (Programme Manager for Shakespeare at the British Council). Zainab won her 15-18 age category

for her creative writing piece titled 'The Search for a Place Called Home'.

The judges were "impressed with the complex layers of meaning and maturity of the piece." She received £25 worth of book vouchers and also had the opportunity to read

part of her entry before an audience at the Annual Rewrite Celebration at Ovalhouse on Saturday, 19th March 2016.
